

Origin of protein used for feeding EU livestock and exports of those products (in Mt protein)







Why is protein on the EU agenda?

- A critical dependency on high protein meals for feeding its livestock
- Also driven by environmental and societal considerations
 - Food security current EU agri-food system resilience/stability
 - Deforestation concerns
 - GHG emissions and environmental performance
 - Nitrogen leakage
 - Fertilisers price
- ➤ Vision for Agriculture and Food European Commission (February 2025)
 - Comprehensive plan to create a more self-sufficient and sustainable EU protein system



The protein EU regulatory and policy landscape



What has been done so far?

- Common Agricultural Policy: support to producers and supply-chain organisation
 - Extended coupled income support to farmers for protein crops
 - Eco-schemes: protein crops remunerated for their environmental services
 - Operational programmes open to protein crops producers organizations (investments, risk management...)
 - Rural Development instruments (risk management, investments, cooperation, knowledge transfer, advise...)
 - Good Agricultural and Environmental conditions for support: favor protein crops
- Research and Innovation: 120 projects, EUR 640 million
- Market transparency: publication of protein crop prices



What has been done so far?

• EU protein policy review: data and information gathering, wide stakeholders

What has been proposed under the last CAP reform proposal (July 2025)?

- Creation of a protein crops sector in the Common Market Organisation Regulation
- Facilitation of the organisation of the value chain: recognition of producers organisation mandatory for Member States for protein crops
- Reinforcement of the support for protein crops under operational programmes by recognised producer organisations
- Enable the setting of marketing standard for protein crops: for originlabelling of protein crops (dried pulses and soya beans)
- Future income support: better targeting of decoupled payments and coupled income support

Next step: a comprehensive plan

- Based on the EU protein policy review and the wide consultation presented earlier
- All sources of protein in a system approach, not just soybeans
- Acknowledge synergies and complementarities (food/feed, feeding systems, circular economy)
- A value chain approach: coordination from farm to retail
- Acknowledge the environmental and health benefits of legumes and plantbased protein
- Research and innovation throughout the chain
